We All Play Sports

Book Summary

This story shows family members of all ages actively involved in different sporting activities.

Features of the Book

- The strong illustration support.
- The high-frequency words "My," "with," and "me."
- Clear, consistently placed text.
- The compound words "baseball," "basketball," and "football."
- The "ays" word ending "plays."
- The names for family members "mom" and "dad."
- The ellipsis on page 7, indicating anticipation.
- The use of bold type for effect.

Purpose

We All Play Sports can be used in a guided reading setting to introduce the following skills and strategies:

- **S** monitoring the reading and ensuring it is making sense using meaning, structure, and visual information from the story;
- sharing own experiences related to the content of the story;
- introducing and discussing new words contained within the story;
- S writing a simple set of instructions.

Introducing the text

Talk about the kinds of sports the children see on television or play at school or on weekends.

- What do you need to play that game?
- Where do you play that sport?
- How many people are on a team?

Read the title and the names of the author and illustrator to the group.

- What sport is this girl playing?
- Can you point to the word that says "sports"?

Reading the text

- Monitoring the reading and ensuring it is making sense using meaning, structure, and visual information from the story.
- Sharing own experiences related to the content of the story.
- Introducing and discussing new words contained within the story.

Page 2

- Who is this? What word tells you?
- What game is she playing?

Explain that she has a mitt and a baseball.

- What else do you need?

Page 3 – Look at the picture and discuss the equipment.

Point to the word for the name of the sport.

- How many people can play this game?

Pages 4 and 5 – Discuss the illustrations: the shape of each ball, how it would bounce, and whether you can use your hands.

- Can you point to the name of each game?

Pages 6 and 7 – Discuss the equipment in the illustrations.

- Do you know how to play this sport?
- How many people can play?

Point out the ellipsis indicating that the sentence has not finished.

Children now read the book independently.

Revisiting the text

- How many different sports were in this story?
- What are some other sports that you know?

Look at the compound words involving "ball."

- What do the words "base," "basket," and "foot" tell us?
- What other ball games can you think of?

Following Up

S Writing a simple set of instructions.

Help the children to write out a simple set of instructions for a sport they like to play.

E Complete the blackline master opposite.
