Movie Mania by Rebecca Green

### **Summary**

Jamar gets a video camera for his birthday and drives his family mad as he makes a documentary for his English class. He redeems himself though when he solves a mystery.

### **Features of the Text**

- · Narrative text with action and dialogue
- Told in the first person
- · Subplot of missing objects
- Subject-specific vocabulary—panning, shooting schedule, video diary, documentary, zooming, lens, editing, tripod, wrap up, DVD, launch, footage

### **Purpose**

Movie Mania can be used for the following purposes:

- making connections;
- exploring the structure of narrative.

# **Guided Reading Summary**

### Introducing the text

Discuss the cover and title together.

- What does mania mean? What might movie mania mean?
- What do you think the story will be about?

## Reading and discussing the text

Ask the students to read to the end of page 4.

- What do you know about the plot so far?
- A narrative usually has a problem. What could be the problem in this story?

Ask the students to read to the end of page 9 and share their ideas about the plot.

- Why is filming his family not as easy as Jamar first imagined?
- Do you think Jamar will finish his project on time? Why do you think that?
- Have you ever tried to film your family or friends? How did they react? How do you feel when someone is filming you?

Ask the students to read to the end of the story.

 What words does the author use to show that the story is coming to an end? (before the project deadline, wrap up, final edit, one last flick through ...)

Discuss the two plots and ask the students to find where the subplot develops.

— Why do you think the author chose to resolve the subplot (missing objects) but not the main plot?

### **Following Up**

The students can:

• use the blackline master on page 61 to complete a timeline of events in the story • write a resolution to the documentary storyline • write a story or make a documentary of their own about being in 6th grade.
