Summary

Samir has the latest digital technology, an EyePalm, to help him find his way around Paris. He runs into trouble, however, when a young girl leads him to ignore basic safety rules.

Features of the Text

Purpose

EyePalm can be used for the following purposes:

- · making predictions;
- determining the author's purpose and point of view;
- making judgments about characters in a story.

Guided Reading Summary

Introducing the text

Ask the students to look at the cover.

- What do you think an EyePalm is? What might it be able to do?
- If you were inventing a piece of digital technology, what would it do?

Reading and discussing the text

Ask the students to read to the end of page 5, taking special note of the descriptive language.

- What do you think the author is trying to establish at this stage?
- Have you ever traveled to a strange city? What did it feel like?
- What do you think is going to happen?

Ask the students to read to the end of page 11.

- How has the text changed? Why do you think it has changed?
- What is the author trying to achieve by using less description and more dialogue?
- What kind of person do you think Justine is? Why do you think that?
- What will happen next?

The students can read to the end of the text.

- Were your predictions accurate? How were they right or wrong?
- Did the ending surprise you? What could happen next?
- What do you think the author is trying to say?
- Do you think the author is making any comment on digital technology and people's attitude to it? What might his message be?

Following Up

The students can:

• use the blackline master on page 49 to complete the character analysis chart • write the next chapter in the adventures of Samir in Paris • list and compare the features, benefits, and drawbacks of different digital devices.
