Book Summary

This title looks at the materials that toys can be made from.

Building Basic Skills

High-frequency words – This, is, of Content words – toy, wood, plastic, wool, metal, glass, paper, cloth, blocks

Repeated phrase – This toy is made of .

Phonics and phonemic awareness – consonant blends: pl, gl, bl; long vowel sound: wood, wool;

Punctuation – full stops, exclamation mark

Special feature

The content of the book has crosscurricular links with the science themes of physical science and science and technology.

Skills and Strategies

Toys can be used to introduce and reinforce the following skills and strategies:

- recognising the relationship between words and images
- pointing one-to-one at each word to ensure an appropriate match
- phonemic awareness
- · making predictions.

- copies of words and punctuation from the Word Cards reproducible for this book, cut and ready for use
- copies of the BM, pencils, felt tip pens

Toys

Introducing the Text

Begin by showing the students some toys from the classroom.

- What is this toy made of?
- Could you make it from anything else?
 (A plastic block could be made from wood.)
- What toys do you have at home? What kinds of material are they made of?

Write the heading "Materials" on a whiteboard or sheet of paper and record these as they are mentioned in discussion or in the book.

Discussion Model

Using only the teacher's copy, discuss each page of the book with the group. Ensure that content words are integrated naturally into the discussion.

Cover – What do you think this book is about? How can you tell? What kinds of toys might be in the book?

Page 2 – What is this toy? What is it made of? What other toys are made of wood?

Page 4 – What is this toy made of? What would it feel like?

Page 6 – How has this toy been made? Could you make a toy like this out of wood or plastic?

Pages 8 to 15 – Continue to discuss the photographs and the toys, asking what they are made of, and if they could be made of any other kind of material.

Page 16 – What kind of toy is this? Who do you think made the toy?

Reading the Text

Hand one book to each child. Together, read the title and the name of the author on the cover and the title page.

Page 2 – Clarify where to begin reading and ask the students to point to each word as you read the sentence aloud together.

Page 4 – Read this sentence aloud together and observe the accuracy of the students' one-to-one matching and their return sweep between lines.

Pages 6 to 16 – Ask the students to read these pages quietly to themselves. If a student has difficulties, encourage the use of reading strategies such as attempting the initial sound of a word.

Revisiting the Text

- Look back through the book, asking individual students to point to the name of each kind of material.
- Ask the students to identify the high-frequency words, "This", "is", and "of" from a variety of pages in the book.
- Using the Word Cards for this book, reassemble the sentences with the students.

Following Up

- Using the BM for this story, the students can complete the sentences using the pattern from the book.
- Students can think of something they have helped to bake and complete the sentence: My _____ is made of
- In pairs, students can take turns to read pages of the story to each other.
